

## **B. Fees and Services**

SAFE provides services at no cost to clients through a variety of funding sources. Some of the funding sources require information such as client demographics, income level, client satisfaction, and efficacy of engagement. SAFE advocates may ask clients to complete an assessment or survey that will be compiled into a database without identifying information. All individual information (name, address, etc.) is protected and is never shared with outside agencies.

All of SAFE's services are structured to help support success in living lives free from violence. Services include:

### **24 Hour Help Line (503-397-6161):**

24-hours, 365 days a year, the help line is staffed by certified confidential domestic and sexual violence advocates with knowledge of local community resources and safety planning dynamics

### **Emergency Response Program:**

24/7 response and in-person support for survivors of domestic and/or sexual violence in hospitals, police stations, or other safe locations

### **Crime Victims' Advocacy and Systems Navigation:**

Confidential safety planning; information and referral to resources; assistance in notifying and helping crime victims obtain their legal rights; help completing and filing protection orders; accompaniment and emotional support at court proceedings; and help connecting, navigating and working with systems of care such as the justice system, social services, health care, etc.

### **The Starting Place Shelter:**

30 day emergency housing for individuals and families fleeing violence; transitional housing for those who qualify as space allows

### **Department of Human Services Co-Located Advocacy:**

In-person advocacy and systems navigation for survivors accessing services through DHS-Child Welfare and/or DHS-Self Sufficiency programs

### **Helpful Education about Relationships for Teens:**

Assistance for Columbia County schools in implementing evidence-based approaches that meet Oregon HB 4077-The Healthy Teen Relationship Act; Assistance for Positive Youth Development programs to address primary prevention of interpersonal violence

**Support Groups:**

On-going and as-needed adult and adolescent support groups for survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault

**ARIA (Assessing Relationships: Information about Abuse):**

A 12-hour course about the cycle and dynamics of intimate partner violence

**Life Skills:**

Educational curriculum helps students recognize their strengths and realize their potential so that they are better prepared to succeed in accomplishing their goals

**Parenting Education:**

Evidence-based curriculum and individual support for parents and caregivers to build stronger connection and skills for raising their children free from violence

**The Ruthann Harris-Inman Family Justice Center:**

A collaborative clinic where survivors of domestic and sexual violence can access a variety of services from multiple agencies in one public setting

**Domestic and Sexual Violence Advocate Certification Training:**

40-hour Domestic and Sexual Violence Victim's Advocate certification training which meets Oregon provider requirements and covers dynamics and resources specific to Columbia County

**Community Outreach and Training:**

Topic-specific training and informational materials available for service providers and community partners include: Overview of SAFE's programs and services, Confidentiality for DV/SA Victims' Advocates, In Her Shoes: Living with Domestic Violence, Community Asset Mapping, OCADSV Anti-Oppression and Allyship workshops, Domestic Violence Dynamics and Advocacy, Sexual Assault Dynamics and Advocacy, Stalking Dynamics and Advocacy, Supporting Adults who were Abused as Children, Effects of Violence on Children, Trauma and the Brain, Vicarious Trauma and Self-Care
